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## CHAIR'S REPORT – Evan Thomas

I am very pleased to make my inaugural report as Chair of the LGAC. As members will recall, I became Vice-Chair in 2012-2013. This past spring, Katia Antonoff, our Chair for 2007-2009 and again in 2012-2013, decided to step down as Chair at the annual general meeting in June. During Katia's most recent term as Chair, she was instrumental in launching the Named Scholarship Program, which has raised \$63,500 for our Scholarship Program. Katia remains a director of the LGAC and provides her counsel as Past Chair. I am very honoured to succeed Katia and thank her for her dedication to the LGAC. I look forward to building on the initiatives launched by her and our other former Chairs.

### **New Executive Members, Director and Canadian Governor**

Following my appointment as Chair, the LGAC's Nominations Committee undertook a search for a new Vice-Chair. We were very fortunate to have a number of extraordinarily well-qualified candidates for this position. After careful consideration, the Nominations Committee recommended Christopher Wilkie as Vice-Chair, and the Board confirmed Christopher's appointment in September. Christopher was previously a director from 2006 to 2009, but stepped down from our Board when he was appointed as Canada's ambassador to the Kingdom of Morocco. Christopher recently returned to Canada and was re-appointed to the LGAC's Board in January 2013. He has already played an important role in organizing events in Ottawa and with respect to the Molson Challenge, as discussed below. Also joining the Executive in 2013-2014 are Peter Harrison, our new Honorary Treasurer, and Leigh Allen, our Recording Secretary. The LGAC Board has also appointed Rachel Pulfer, a former Scholarship winner and Board member (2005 to 2007), as a director at the September board meeting.

Peter succeeds Rob Douglas, who has been the LGAC's Honorary Treasurer since 2006. During Rob's tenure as Treasurer, the LGAC's finances have been carefully managed and the quality of the financial information presented to the Board has improved significantly. Rob continues to be a director, the Honorary Secretary and a member of the Finance Committee. We are all very grateful to Rob for his dedicated service to the LGAC over the past two decades.

On behalf of the LGAC, I would like to congratulate Kate McCrone, a longtime director and past Chair of the LGAC, on her retirement as Canadian Governor of Goodenough College as of the October 2013 Governors' meeting. We are very proud that Maureen Simpson, Co-chair of our Scholarship Committee, will succeed Kate as Canadian Governor.

Finally, I wish to recognize Elizabeth Owens, Usman Sheikh, Benjamin Shinewald and Heidi Wells, who retired as directors of the LGAC effective as of the June AGM. Members present at the AGM unanimously passed a motion recognizing their efforts and expressing the LGAC's thanks to these Board members for their contributions to the LGAC.

### **Continuance Under New Not-For-Profit Corporations Act**

As past Chair Katia Antonoff explained in the Spring Newsletter, at this year's AGM members were asked to approve the LGAC's continuance as a corporation under the new federal Not-For-Profit Corporations Act to comply with legislative changes. I am pleased to report that this motion passed at the AGM. In accordance with this motion, minor changes to the by-laws to conform to the requirements of the new Act were approved by the Board at the September board meeting, and the LGAC is in the process of completing the continuance. Thank you to former Chair Andrew Gray and Rob Douglas for their work on this matter.

### **Co-operation with Trudeau Foundation**

Many members are already aware that in June 2013, the College and the Pierre Elliot Trudeau Foundation celebrated an agreement of co-operation with a reception, lecture and other activities. I am also very pleased to report that the LGAC and the Trudeau Foundation have discussed how our two organizations can co-operate within Canada, and to that end, the Trudeau Foundation invited all members of the LGAC to attend the Xth Annual Trudeau Foundation Conference in Montreal from November 21-23, 2013.

### **Scholarship Program**

Our Scholarship Program continues to thrive, thanks primarily to the efforts of our Scholarship Committee, consisting of Selena Beattie, Sylvia Berg, Norman Hillmer and Yohanna Loucheur and led by co-Chairs Greg Smith and Maureen Simpson. For 2013-2014, we have awarded Scholarships to six very impressive Canadians, brief biographies of whom can be found elsewhere in the Newsletter. These awards bring the total number of funded Scholarships awarded since 1990 to 157, with a combined value of nearly \$1,000,000, which next year we will surely pass.

As many know, however, tuition, residence and other expenses for students pursuing post-graduate studies in London continues to rise. To keep pace with these rising costs, in 2012 the LGAC launched its Named Scholarship Program with a goal of raising \$100,000 in capital by the end of 2013 to increase the number and value of LGAC Scholarships over time. As noted above, we are very proud that to date we have raised \$63,500 towards that goal, and we thank all of our donors for their generous support of the Scholarship Program and the LGAC's other activities.

We are also very proud that two of this year's Scholarships are the first two Scholarships named in accordance with the Named Scholarship Program:

- Avalon Fotheringham is the recipient of the Neil Black Memorial Scholarship, which was funded to a significant degree by the contributions of Robert Black and Judith Adams and named in recognition of Robert's late father, Neil, who encouraged Robert to study in London.
- Melisa Yorgancioglu is the recipient of the Elaine and Michael Granatstein Memorial Scholarship. Norman Hillmer, director of the LGAC and Professor of History and International Affairs at Carleton University, is the benefactor of this Scholarship, which is named in memory of the late wife and son of the eminent historian J.L. Granatstein.

I wish to note that members present at the June AGM unanimously passed motions recognizing Robert and Judith, Norman and Robert Douglas for their generous contributions to the Named Scholarship Program and thanking them for their support. We are all very grateful for their generosity to our Scholarship Program.

### **The Molson Challenge**

Finally, the LGAC and the College are very pleased to announce the Molson Challenge. Thanks to the leadership of Andrew Molson (LH 01-02 and LGAC Board member 2005-09), the Molson Foundation, a family foundation supporting initiatives across Canada, has offered the LGAC a grant of up to CAN\$400,000 designated for the refurbishment of the College. The donation takes the form of a matching grant with the challenge to the LGAC to raise an equal amount of donations in Canada which would raise the total donations for the College's refurbishment to \$800,000.

As members know, William Goodenough House was extensively renovated in 2011-2012, and the College recently closed London House for an extensive refurbishment program. These refurbishment programs will no doubt solidify the College's position as the pre-eminent residence for international postgraduate students in London and one of the finest residences for students in the United Kingdom.

The LGAC accepted the proposal by the Molson Foundation at a special Board meeting in October and looks forward to meeting the challenge. The LGAC Board has created a new Fundraising Committee led by Vice-Chair Christopher Wilkie, to advise and assist the LGAC in raising funds towards the refurbishment of the College, as well as for the Scholarship Program and the LGAC's other activities. We will be in touch in the months ahead with further details on these developments.

We are no doubt in an exciting time for both the College and the LGAC. I thank all of our Directors, Executive members and our stalwart administrator, Brian Cardie, for their continuing service to the LGAC, and I also thank all of our members for their generous support of the LGAC. ## GOVERNOR'S REPORT FROM THE SQUARE, FALL 2013 – Kate McCrone

This, my final report as the Canadian Governor, follows my recent, very pleasant eight-day stay at the Goodenough Club while attending, on October 15<sup>th</sup>, the Goodenough College Annual General Meeting and the semi-annual meeting of the College Advisory Council.

LGAC Scholarship Committee Co-chair, Greg Smith, was also resident in the Club while in London for the launch of his recently published book (see Member News). Greg and I were very pleased to be able to attend the delightful reception for Canadian students which Andrew Ritchie hosted at William Goodenough House on October 14<sup>th</sup>, and to meet a number of our current and past LGAC Scholarship winners. What impressive young people they are, and how proud the LGAC and indeed Canada can be of them! We encouraged them, of course, to join the LGAC when they return to Canada.

The agendas of the Annual and Advisory Council Meetings were once again dominated by matters refurbishment. The closure of London House in July 2013 for 14 months created major disruption, as students, staff, IT and catering were moved to William Goodenough House. However, the Director reported that the staff performed yeoman service, and that the new arrangements are working well. The Director reported further that:

- The College provided accommodation in WGH to the majority of London House residents who wished to remain in the Square and made housing arrangements for others in the vicinity;
- The number of applications for 2013-14 for 70 single rooms and 30 flats was 689, and the number of residents at present is 384 including families (as opposed to over 700 last year when both houses were open);
- Members are from 75 nations and attend 38 academic institutions; Canadians remain the largest single group;
- 43% of members are from the Commonwealth, a reduction caused by the majority of members being returning residents so freedom of choice was limited, and by priority being given to applicants from scholarship bodies such as Chevening, Fulbright, Marshall, etc. in order to maintain links with these important strategic partners; the College will focus on achieving the 50% Commonwealth target next year when both houses are once again open;
- 26% of members are studying at UCL or an associated institute, 13% at LSE, and 11% at King's College; 47% are in doctoral programs and 43% in Master's;
- The College has launched an exciting new partnership with Canada's Trudeau Foundation;
- The London House refurbishment is well underway, and is being monitored very closely; [I found it rather eerie to see completely empty that large, lovely building, that is so central to College life and operations];

While the pace of change at the Burn remains slow, the overall trend is positive; there have been major personnel changes; refurbishment (i.e. boilers, roof, bathrooms) is underway; and there will be major efforts at marketing among Scottish universities and to exploit new business opportunities.

The Dean, Roger Llewellyn, reported that:

- Despite the reduced numbers in residence and the relatively cramped quarters in WGH, the extra-curricular life of the College is continuing well;
- A temporary kitchen has been constructed in the courtyard between WGH and Crossley Court, and full English breakfasts and light lunches are being served in the WGH large common room; a Costa coffee outlet is open until 5 pm in the WGH Bar for hot drinks throughout the day;
- For evening meals, the butteries/kitchenettes are being heavily used; flats residents are inviting single residents to join them; some members are eating at their colleges; and prix fixe arrangements have been made for members at local restaurants;
- Faculty dinners will be held at the Royal Overseas League, St. James's, and balls, at the Welsh Club on Gray's Inn Road.

The Director of Development and External Relations, Mark Lewis, reported that:

- The LGAC has been awarded a grant of up to \$400,000 by the Molson Foundation for the refurbishment of the College, with the understanding that it will be matched through fundraising by the LGAC in Canada;
- Applications have been submitted or are being prepared for submission to a number of other trusts and foundations in the UK and abroad;
- The focus of the annual telethon in November will be on restoration of the public spaces in London House;
- Various alumni events have been and will be held in London and abroad, and attempts are being made to raise the College profile through new websites for the College, Club and Burn and through the use of social media.

Andrew Ritchie noted that fundraising activities in the New Year will continue under a new Director of Development, for whom a search is underway, as Mark Lewis has resigned, effective the end of 2013, in order to pursue graduate studies at Birkbeck College. The Director extended warm thanks to Mark for his very effective work, and wished him well. The LGAC's many positive interactions with Mark will result in our missing him greatly, I'm sure.

The Advisory Council voted to approve the College Strategic Plan 2014-2016. In October 2010 the Council approved a new such plan on the recommendation of the Board, after extensive consultation with stakeholders. The Plan articulated College values and goals more strategically than before, and is updated annually for review and approval by the Board and Advisory Council. It was significantly amended this year, in recognition of the necessity for the College to look beyond the refurbishment of London House to its wider long term goals. Notable changes include:

- An explicit reference in the Mission to the College's role in developing the leadership potential of students;
- The inclusion of an Ambition section which links the Mission to the Strategic Goals;
- A restructuring of the Strategic Goals (formerly Core Objectives) to include for the first time raising the College profile globally and pursuing strategic partnerships, and emphasizing the need to sustain the College as an enduring institution "underpinned by secure finances, a well-maintained estate and high quality staff".

The plan now covers a three-year rolling period, although it will continue to be reviewed annually. The period to 2016 will continue to be challenging as the College completes the refurbishment project and returns to normal. After that the Plan will likely need a more comprehensive revision. Toward the end of the meeting I was pleased to present a report from the LGAC that included information about:

- Our Scholarship Program, such as the application and review process, current scholarship values, past and current winners, fundraising for the Program, and the total of close to \$1,000,000 that the LGAC has remitted to the College for scholarships since 1990; this figure impressed the Council and elicited an enthusiastic response;
- The June 2013 LGAC AGM that Andrew Ritchie attended, and Founders' Day events in October in Toronto and Ottawa;
- Changes to the LGAC's leadership and Executive Committee, and the next Canadian Governor.

Lord Robert Fellowes' term as President of the Advisory Council ended with the October meeting. Professor René Weis, a Goodenough College alumnus and distinguished Professor of English at University College London, was confirmed as the new President. I, for my part, was delighted that the Council approved the appointment of Maureen Simpson, the LGAC's long-serving Board member and Scholarship Committee Co-chair, as the new Canadian Governor. I wish Maureen and the College well, and extend sincere thanks to the LGAC and College for according me the considerable privilege of serving as Governor for the past three years.

## LONDON REPORT – Mark Lewis, Goodenough Director of Development & Alumni Relations

The refurbishment of London House is progressing well. Most of us watch it from afar as we pass by that end of the Square. All of the College's daily life, as it were, is this year contained in William Goodenough House. However, it is still somewhat dislocating to see builders in hard hats entering and leaving London House, rather than students.

You will have read elsewhere in this newsletter of the wonderful Molson Challenge which aims to raise \$800,000 in total for the refurbishment project. I can assure you that these funds are of great value to the College and will have an enormous impact. The support of the Molson Foundation and LGAC is greatly appreciated on this side of the 'pond' and we shall do what we can to help the Challenge be successful.

With fewer Members and spaces for activities over here in Willie G, there are fewer events than in a regular year, but those which are occurring are well-attended. Last week, the former Chairman of New Zealand's Reserve Bank gave a wonderful port talk; a day or so earlier, all the College enjoyed a great 'dining in' night using Westminster College, just round the corner on Gray's Inn Road. Sports teams and family activities continue, as do performances by our musicians. It is proving to be a vibrant year in its own way!

This morning, I joined more than 60 Members, Alumni and staff for the College's Annual Remembrance Day Service. We gathered in the new Willie G Quad to lay a wreath and for the two-minute silence. Such events remind us that communities must also share in tragedies and sadness as much as they do fun and celebration. When that community is as international as Goodenough College, those tragedies can have worldwide repercussions. A few weeks ago we had a similar gathering, for a Memorial Service for Ravi Ramrattan, a Member of Goodenough from 2008-10, who died tragically in the terrorist attack on the Westgate Shopping Centre in Nairobi, Kenya. Born in Trinidad, Ravi was a great contributor to College life and popular amongst his fellow Members. He will be greatly missed by his friends and family (who were at the service) and by Alumni around the world.

## RECENT LGAC EVENTS IN CANADA

The LGAC has hosted a number of very successful events in recent months. In June, we were very pleased to welcome Major General Andrew Ritchie, Director of Goodenough College, to our annual general meeting and reception. The Director also attended an event in Ottawa. Later in the summer, we held a casual get-together for departing students and alumni in Toronto. These summer events were followed by events in early October in both Ottawa and Toronto to celebrate the College's Founders Day, which recognized the 82nd anniversary of the founding of the College on October 4, 1931. The events coincided with similar events at the College and various cities in the United States, South Africa, Mexico, Bangladesh and Germany.

## 2013-2014 LGAC SCHOLARSHIP WINNERS

**Avalon Fotheringham** (Neil Black Memorial Scholarship) is a textile artist who holds a BFA from Concordia University. She is passionate about art history, community studies and textile production, and is enrolled in Asian Design MA offered by the Royal College of Art in conjunction with the V&A.

**Lorena Fuentes** (Allan J. Hartley Memorial Scholarship) completed a BA in Sociology at the University of British Columbia and an MSc in Human Rights at the LSE. She is currently enrolled in the MPhil/PhD program in Development Studies at Birkbeck College.
