CHAIR'S REPORT by Catherine (Katia) Antonoff

I am very pleased to announce that in mid-June, Andrew Ritchie, the Director of Goodenough College, will be visiting Canada. The Director hopes to see and meet many members in Toronto on June 19, and Ottawa on June 20, 2013. Please plan on attending the LGAC event in Toronto, or Ottawa, or even both. Details can be found above this report.

At the June 19, 2013 Annual General and Special Meeting, members will be asked to approve two documents to satisfy the requirements of the new Not-For-Profit Corporations (NFPC) Act. Both documents may be reviewed in full by [downloading them from the LGAC's website](#) at www.lgac.ca after June 1, 2013.

This year, the LGAC's AGM is actually designated as an Annual General and Special Meeting, since members are being asked to pass a Special Resolution, requiring a two-thirds majority, for the LGAC to continue its incorporation under the new federal Not-For-Profit Corporations Act. All existing not-for-profit corporations, including all federally incorporated charities such as the LGAC, are required to reincorporate under the new Act by October 2014 or lose their corporate status. The Board is bringing these changes forward to the meeting this year to ensure that the required measures are in place well in advance of the deadline. In the last newsletter, the LGAC launched a Named Scholarship campaign to raise \$100,000 in capital for the Scholarship Program with the specific objective of increasing the amount of our Scholarships. As you know, the Scholarship Program is the heart of the LGAC's activities. Since 1990, we have awarded over \$925,000 to 151 funded Scholarship winners. This is a truly remarkable achievement that has provided an outstanding group of young Canadians the opportunity to live in London as residents of Goodenough College, an experience that we all well remember.

The Board of Directors has designed the Named Scholarship Program to offer special incentives to past donors in the form of Donor Credits, recognizing that their prior donations would have helped to fund one or more Scholarships without the opportunity to name a Scholarship. I have been extremely encouraged with the generous response of three donors who have made multi-year Scholarship donation commitments totaling \$63,500. This total includes \$32,000 for four Scholarships at the full cost of \$8,000 each that are additional to the Scholarships eligible for Donor Credits.

I would like to encourage you to review the [Named Scholarship documents](#) found on our website, and consider making a single or multi-year donation to fund a Named Scholarship.

The Scholarship Committee, led by our stalwart Co-Chairs, Maureen Simpson and Greg Smith, along with members Selena Beattie, Sylvia Berg, Norman Hillmer and Yohanna Loucheur, met in early spring to select the 2013-2014 LGAC Scholarship Winners. Once again, the winners' list is composed of distinguished Canadian students from diverse disciplines, ranging from the study of Infectious Diseases to Human Rights.

I would like to thank the many LGAC Directors who have worked tirelessly on a number of significant projects throughout the year, particularly those who helped design and launch the Named Scholarship Program and campaign, the Directors who contributed in great detail to the Reincorporation process, the members of the Scholarship Committee, the Directors who have organized events throughout the past year in Toronto and Ottawa, (December 2012 with the visit of Mark Lewis), the organizers of the events in Calgary in May, and in Toronto and Ottawa in June. I would also like to thank the Newsletter and Web Editors, our Canadian Governor of Goodenough College, and our indispensable LGAC Administrator, Brian Cardie.

I am extremely grateful to Rob Douglas, Honorary Secretary and Treasurer, without whom the LGAC would be not nearly as active, and to Evan Thomas, Vice Chair, whose diligence and reliability has been a constant source of support,

Finally, my most sincere thanks go out to LGAC Members and Donors, whose enormous generosity has enabled the LGAC to thrive, and progress ever so close to a total sum of one million dollars in funds for our Scholarship winners. It has been a very productive and active year for the LGAC, with significant accomplishments. This is due largely to the work of individuals on our Board, our Donors, and Members, who all enable the LGAC to evolve and succeed in its mission.

LONDON NEWS by Mark Lewis, Goodenough Director of Development & Alumni Relations

With spring finally arriving in London, the College is gearing up for the refurbishment of London House. The building will be closing in July with the aim of reopening in time for the 2014-15 academic year. As explained by the Director in the last Goodenough News, the bulk of the works will be to the building's infrastructure. It will be a challenging project, but absolutely necessary for the long-term benefit of the College.

Next year therefore we shall be running everything from Willie G. Staff and members are developing plans to ensure that communal activities continue to thrive. We shall for example be holding the Winter and Spring Balls in the London Welsh Centre on Gray's Inn Road. Similarly, staff normally housed in London House will be moving into offices in WGH, transformed temporarily from several of the flats.

Summer term exam fervour is always matched by a plethora of activities, several of which have a distinctly Canadian flavour. On June 10th the College shall be hosting the first ever Trudeau Lecture outside of Canada given by Professor Macartan Humphreys, a Trudeau Fellow, on policy making and politics in the Congo. The lecture marks the beginning of a new and exciting partnership between the College and the Pierre Trudeau Foundation.

The following week, sees a host of activities for Canadian Cultural Week, including film screenings, a First Nations night, a Canadian pub crawl and a hockey competition; not even street hockey this year however, but instead we're promised it will be 'knee' or 'chair' hockey!

Those of you passing through London are more than welcome to attend events – keep your eye on our newsletter, *the Goods*, for more details – and are particularly reminded of the Annual Alumni Reception on Friday 12th July. This will be held in Willie G this year, a great opportunity to visit if you haven't seen the newly-refurbished building.

GOVERNOR'S REPORT FROM THE SQUARE – Kate McCrone

In connection with a visit to London for the semi-annual meeting of the Goodenough College Advisory Council on April 16, I was in residence in the Bilbrough Suite, London House, from April 2 – 17. Andrew Ritchie and Mark Lewis, along with Roger Llewellyn and Caroline Persaud, gave me the usual warm welcome, which contributed significantly to the strong feeling of homecoming I always have when returning to the Square.

I had individual, very informative meetings with Andrew and Mark over breakfast, and over coffee, with the College's new Finance Director, Colin Bailey. Further, although many students were away during the Easter vacation, Mark and his staff arranged a reception in Freddie's at which I was pleased to meet 20 Canadian students, including several LGAC Scholarship winners. Like their predecessors for generations, all expressed great enthusiasm for life at the College and in London. A happy bonus for me was having dinner with four students who lingered after the reception.

The agenda of the Advisory Council meeting was once again dominated by matters involving the William Goodenough House (WGH) refurbishment project (which was completed under budget and on time) and the massive planning required by closure of and renovations to London House in 2013-14. Andrew Ritchie reported that there are around 750 residents in the College this year (including children), the largest number ever. Approximately 400 are in WGH, where, because of the private facilities and despite the higher rent, the demand for rooms now exceeds that for London House.

London House will be closed from July 1, 2013 for 14 months. Insofar as possible the life of the College will carry on, but there is no doubt that it will be much affected. College offices will relocate temporarily to three, 3-bedroom suites in WGH, and the only public spaces available will be the large and small common rooms, the bar, the library, and the Canadian Scholars' Room in Willy G. As for meal service, three new butteries will be built, and breakfast only will be served in the large common room, which will be available the rest of the day for other purposes. The College is attempting to make special dining arrangements for students at local restaurants and at University of London facilities, and is exploring access to off-site space in such places as the Welsh Club on Grey's Inn Road and the Royal Overseas League, St. James', for functions like Faculty dinners. Of course, the intake of new students and total number of students in residence will be much reduced. (LGAC scholarship winners will continue to be guaranteed places.) As during the WGH closure, the College will seek alternative accommodation in Bloomsbury for residents who wish to stay on but cannot be accommodated.

During the London House renovations, which will be done by Ardmore, the WGH contractor, extensive upgrading to heating, wiring, and plumbing will occur; the Great Hall, ground floor, corridors, and bedrooms will be freshened up; new furniture will be placed in bedrooms (but not private facilities); and bathrooms will be upgraded. One criticism of the "new" WGH is the perceived sterility of the reception desk area which is now a rather stark white; assurances have been given that the London House reception hall will retain its rich wood and warm atmosphere.

Among other matters reported on at the Council meeting were:

- the necessity to obtain an additional loan from Barclays for the London House refurbishment, and this happening only after a careful assessment of risk management;
- the financial performance of the College and Club in 2012-13 being good;
- the financial performance of The Burn being an on-going concern, and active efforts being taken to connect with Scottish universities;
- the rents at WGH being increased significantly to reflect the added amenities, and once the LH refurbishment is complete, the intention to have differential rents for single rooms that reflect rooms' size, location, and amenities.

Lord Robert Fellowes' term as President of the Governors ends following the October meeting. Subject to appropriate approvals, Professor René Weis, a Goodenough College alumnus and Professor of English at University College London, will succeed him, the first alumnus to hold that position.

I expect to be present at the next Advisory Council meeting--the last of my term on Council--on October 15, 2013, following which I look forward to reporting as usual to LGAC members.

LGAC ALBERTA RECEPTION



The LGAC was pleased to have its first event in Calgary in a long time, a reception hosted by Alberta Directors Brian Marley-Clarke and Kristine Alexander, at The Ranchmen's Club on Friday, May 10th. This event was attended by Mr. Tony Kay, the new British Consul General in Calgary. The reception was extremely enjoyable. Mr. Kay was enthusiastic about supporting this new friendship with the LGAC, and it is hoped that a Member Reception in Calgary will become a more regular event. The last event held here was in the era of Goodenough College Director, Tim Toyne Sewell.

LGAC NOW ACCEPTS DONATIONS OF SECURITIES

In December, the LGAC accepted its first donation through the transfer of securities and established the administrative process for other donors. Since 2006, Canadians have been able to donate securities to a charity and take advantage of a provision in the *Income Tax Act* under which a capital gain on the disposition of the donated securities is excluded in the donor's tax calculation. This can provide the donor with an additional tax benefit if the cost base of the security would normally trigger a capital gain.

Tax Example

For example, assume an Ontario donor with a combined federal and provincial marginal tax rate of 40%. If the donor has already made a charitable donation of \$200 in the year, subsequent donations will receive a tax credit of about 40%, thereby offsetting the tax on income for the donation amount. Normally, if the taxpayer sells a security where the proceeds of disposition is higher than the security's cost base, 50% of the capital gain is taxed as income at the taxpayer's marginal tax rate. However, if a donor makes the donation through the transfer of securities, the capital gain is excluded. For instance, if the market value of the security is 45% higher than the cost base of the security, the tax on the capital gain would normally be 9% (40% x 50% x 45%). The 9% saving raises the total tax benefit from the donation from 40% to 49%. Note that the calculation will vary from province to province and depends, obviously, on the size of the capital gain on the specific donated security.

Donation Process

The LGAC has posted a Donation of Securities Form on its website (www.lgac.ca). On the Form, the donor provides the name of the security and the specific number of shares to be donated, as well as the donor's investment account information. The donor delivers the Form to his or her investment advisor who arranges for the transfer of the securities from the donor's investment account to the LGAC's investment account at BMO Harris. (The LGAC's investment account information is also on the Form). While the security's transfer can usually be executed within a few hours after the donor delivers the Form to his or her investment advisor, donors should be aware that the value of the donation is based on the 'fair market value' of the securities at the actual at the time of day that BMO Harris receives the securities into the LGAC's account and the LGAC will issue a tax receipt for this amount. In order to minimize the LGAC's market risk, the LGAC will instruct BMO Harris to sell the donated securities as soon as possible after they are received in its account. Any change in the value of the securities after receipt in the LGAC's account does not affect the donation amount. When the time comes for the donor to file his or her income tax return, the donor records the transaction on the Canada Revenue Agency Form 1170, inputting the donation amount as the cost base of the donated securities, rather than the actual historical cost base, thereby eliminating any capital gain.

While there is no specified minimum donation amount for making a donation of securities, it will likely be of interest to donors considering a donation of \$1,000 or more. The LGAC needs to be advised in advance of any securities donation so it can instruct BMO Harris to sell the securities as soon as possible after they reach the LGAC's account. TREASURER'S REPORT – 2012 FINANCIAL RESULTS by Rob Douglas

The LGAC's financial results for 2012 showed continued improvement with Donations totaling a record high of \$138,078. This total includes the fifth and final donation of \$50,000 from the Molson Foundation, completing its financial commitment to donate \$250,000 over 5 years to endow a Scholarship. Individual donations for the Scholarship Fund were \$44,471, and increase of \$22,847 largely reflecting the first donations under the Named Scholarship Program. Donations to the College declined after the large increase in 2011 to support the College's 80th and the LGAC's 60th anniversaries. Investment income, which now includes the change in unrealized gains or losses, increased to \$58,779 vs. a loss of \$2,959 in 2011, largely reflecting the improvement in the portfolio's market valuation.

Operating expenses declined in 2012, given the large number of events in 2011 and the related expenses of the art sale. Scholarship Program expenses increased in 2012 as a result of the increase in the award amount to £4,800 vs. £4,500 and an increase in the number of Scholarships. One winner in 2011 declined in late September, reducing the number of awards that year.

Net Assets in 2012 were \$1,027,863, an increase of \$87,826 resulting from the LGAC's Net Revenue for the year of \$87,725. At December 31, 2012 the portfolio's market value was \$1,041,621, compared to \$942,668 at the end of 2011. As of March 31, 2013 the portfolio's market value showed a small increase to \$1,053,547.
